This week we held Heritage Day. Every year on this day, we gather in a formal manner to remember and celebrate who we are as a community.

Our values are the most important element in defining what is always true for our school community. They are the core of who we are. Be your Best is based on the presence of these values and on our beliefs. Values and belief give us direction; they are our compass.

The idea of Be your Best also accepts that we all have the opportunity to choose a lesser path. Be your Best is the encouragement to set your standards high. To Be your Best requires actually living out what you believe internally; that who you are inside is who you are outside.

At Calvin Christian School we value serving others, and having the courage to stand up for what is right.

The African American poet, Maja Angelou, observes, "Courage is the most important virtue. For without courage you cannot practice any of the other virtues consistently."

Both courage, and living for others have played impressive roles in our school's history.

Even before the school was established, our founders, and the parents of some of our founders were living out their beliefs in the most remarkable circumstances. They lived for others even when it meant the ultimate cost for themselves and for those whom they loved.

During World War II the Netherlands was occupied by the Nazis. In the greatest genocide in history, the Nazi fanatics murdered 15 Million Jewish people. Many of these were Jewish people from and in the Netherlands. Men and women who would later become Calvin's founders chose to work to oppose the evil of Nazism as either members of the resistance or by protecting Jewish people from persecution.

In a recent conversation with a descendent of some of these people, their bravery was very simply explained thus:

"It was their faith; because of that it was their duty. They did it for families."

Some of our founders hid people in their houses in basements and false walls. This was incredibly dangerous. If the Nazis suspected this, they would raid the house. If caught, people would be taken and tortured, sent to concentration camps and/or killed. Some people were caught.

Among the guests at Calvin on Heritage Day were people whose parents stood in conviction, endured the terror of searches, had to escape arrest, and experienced the horror and brutality of arrest. In one example I heard, a strategy of protection was to change the pronunciation of a Jewish surname to Dutch to obscure its origin.

Our Founders also assisted others to build false walls in houses in order to hide people.

Our Founders were involved in acts of humanitarian courage by smuggling food and hiding people. I am sure they were involved in deliberate acts of violent resistance.

These people, who were amongst the founders of our school, were wanted men and women. The people are impressive. They had a relationship with Christ that was real. They deliberately chose to live their faith against persecution.

They stood and protected the weak, the vulnerable and the oppressed. They lived their faith to benefit others who were not of their own faith.

We should draw so much from them. Their faith and the humanity and courage with which they lived is inspiring. It is their faith and courage that serves to define the core of our school.

And so we return to where we started today, understanding:

- that values are the real heart of a school; and
- that we are Missionaries carrying out what we believe in faith.

The lives of those who go before us require nothing of you personally. They would be first to acknowledge that you live in freedom, and thus have the right to act as you choose. The contribution of those who precede us should be to encourage us. That is quite literally to say, that it should "put courage into" us.

Their example should make us bolder.

It should make us stand a little taller.

We should be inspired to act not just consider.

We should be more ready to face the challenges.

We must be aware of the warning from Maja Angelou, and resist making our Founders untouchable. We recognise their humanity and in that their frailty. In this, we stand with them.

By Being our Best we continue the heart of Calvin.

Top Schools recgonised in Media: 2016 NAPLAN Results

Many of you may have seen the article in *The Mercury* on Wednesday 8 March covering the release of the detailed 2016 NAPLAN results. These are published on the My School website this week. (Go to www.myschool.edu.au and enter school name)

Much is made of the NAPLAN results. It is a valid measure of student progress. It does measure important elements of a school's core business. Of course, not all things are measured by NAPLAN.

CALVIN was once again singled out for its achievement in NAPLAN. In 2015 we were judged by the National curriculum authority ACARA as having fostered outstanding increases in student outcomes. We were one of only 300 schools out of more than 9,000 around Australia to be honoured for this achievement.

This year we shared in the accolades with The Friends School, another top Hobart independent school. We congratulate them on their 2016 achievement.

Our 2016 results were again excellent.

The results provide further strong evidence that our teachers add value to students learning outcomes.

We define value-adding in two ways.

- Firstly, our students achieve MORE than 12 months learning in any calendar year.
- Secondly, that because of the **positive learning environment** at Calvin students **should achieve at least at their optimal level.** We know that building a high-expectations culture assists people to achieve more than they may have on their own.

We aim to add value to both the speed and quality of student's progress, and also, their eventual outcome.

If an ideal rate of progress is not being achieved we would desire to sit with parents and understand how this could be attained.

Our 2016 results demonstrated that we are adding value at every year level in **Reading, Writing** and **Mathematics.**

Our performances in NAPLAN are comparable to those achieved by other top independent schools in Hobart.

An interesting article on what to do when having tough conversations with teenagers!

Controlling what you can in a tough conversation with a teenager

Sports psychologists use a common phrase when working with their sports stars – *Control the controllables*.

They say that a sportsperson can control their EAR – Effort, Attitude and their Response to a problem.

When it comes to managing a problem with your child or teenager where he or she has 'crossed the line', you can control what you're going to say and how you are going to say it and what attitude you will take into the conversation you're going to have with them. You can control what you're going to say and you will be able to do this better if you have a plan and if you follow a process – keeping to the facts of the matter and eventually by clearly asking for what you want from them, next time.

Going into any conversation with your son or daughter, you'll do better if you can remember two things: Your acknowledgement of their feelings (if they get upset with you) is not your agreement with their feelings and, you don't have to show up for every argument to which you've been invited!

You can also improve your performance in a conversation like this by imagining how you are going to react, before you actually have the conversation. In other words, this is when you picture yourself in a tough conversation and imagining how you'll react. For example:



- Imagine where you are going to be sitting when you're having the conversation. In fact, I suggest that you actually sit there and imagine starting the conversation.
- Think how your teenager might be, what they'll look like (probably grumpy) and how you'll respond if they get uppity with you.
- Imagine yourself staying calm but firm and insisting on what you need while also giving ground where you need to.
- Notice any negative or angry reactions you might be feeling and think about how you would restrain these.
- Visualise yourself responding if they get upset. continued next page

Just a little bit of written preparation and some visualising can go a long way towards helping you remain composed. To sum up, here are the three controllables you can focus on when you are going to hold a tough conversation:

- You can control the attitude you take into the conversation. You can make a decision to go into the situation with courage and firmness. You don't need to fight.
- You can control the script of what you are going to say, which will enable you to be well prepared to solve the problem. If your teenager gets upset, you can acknowledge what they are feeling to get the conversation back on track.
- 3. You can control what you imagine and how you see yourself coping in the conversation — even before you have it. In other words, you can visualise success!

A friend is someone whom we enjoy being with and feel safe with, besides our own family. We may have a loving and supportive household but we still need to make friends and maintain positive relationships with other people.

Research shows that people may sometimes find it more comfortable interacting with friends than with their family. Moreover, compared to a young child who tends to rely more on their family, an older child or teenager will tend to rely more on their friends for support.
