Our CST Board Chair, Mr Lance Conry, recently addressed a State Conference of Christian teachers and leaders and thanked them for being "...secure enough in their faith to allow children to be insecure in theirs."

The movement from the faith of a child to a child-like faith as an adult is no simple transition. Earnest faith may be a mustard seed, but the process of developing mature faith is like switching on a light. It is for many a fraught process.

Unfortunately, too many children in Christian schools lose their faith or are discouraged by the church. There are large bodies of evidence into this by George Barna (www.barna. com) and Ken Ham (www.answersingenesis.org). The book, *Already Gone* presents Ken Ham's research and analysis.

He finds that of all the 20 to 29 year-old evangelicals who attended church regularly and no longer do so:

- 95% attended church regularly during their primary years of school;
- 55% attended church regularly during high school;
- 11% were still attending church during university.

So, between the ages of 10 and 20 years 89% of young people dropped out of attending church.

Ham cites two general reasons for this:

- Children not having answers to the scientific objections to Biblical reliability; and
- Children objecting to the hypocrisy, legalism and self-righteousness of the church. Importantly, many people may have left the church, but they have not left the faith.

It seems imperative that we assist our children as they navigate the challenges of our contemporary world. The challenge is certainly happening in these areas in Australian society right now.

Dr Larry Stephens provides an excellent framework for understanding the importance of the process of learning in relation to a child's faith.

Between the ages of 4 and 7, a child should internalise the grace of God, and begin to apply the truth of God to their lives, though still living in a fantasy world. Not achieving this leaves the child in self-condemnation.

Between the ages of 8 and 13, a child should develop a healthy image of God. They should learn about prayer, worship, and devotion. The alternative is a distorted image of His love.

From the ages of 14 to 20, children search for spiritual meaning and the purpose of life. Importantly, they only believe what they can validate from experience or from their parents. Our children are living in a dangerous time for their faith.

In a climate of advocacy for human rights and in a quest to eliminate discrimination there are any number of political debates that will either deepen or dampen our children's faith.

Are we secure enough in our faith to explore with our children their private thinking on these issues? It is imperative that we engage with what our children are actually thinking about these issues. They are needing to work through the paradoxes of the world and secure their faith.

We must entertain their questions. We must linger in close relational and conversational proximity with them in their doubts.

It is my prayer that we are not so mindful of the events in the market-place that we miss the challenge of faith that might be occurring in our living room.

This week 57 students from Year 2 through to Year 6 participated in ICAS Maths tests, which assesses a students' skill and knowledge in Algebra and Patterns, Chance and Data, Measures and Units, Number and Arithmetic and Space and Geometry. ICAS then provide a detailed analysis of your child's achievement. I want to congratulate all our students who chose to participate and challenge themselves in the area of mathematics. We now look forward to receiving your results.

Sharp Reading

As a school we have invested in a whole school approach to teaching literacy where all teachers share the same principles in their teaching and learning programs. We know that students do not learn and cannot enjoy learning through struggling. A key to increased engagement and motivation is through ensuring students experience success in each lesson while maintaining an appropriate level of challenge.

This week, Brian Parker has being providing our teachers with one to one support in their delivery of their reading program in their classrooms. Brian is an international consultant who trains teachers to be able to cause students to become active readers who are able to comprehend and think critically on what they read. This is a necessary skill for all our students as they progress through the school. Since last term, we are seeing tremendous achievement by our students and we expect this trend to continue.

Tonight, when you read with your child ask them to teach you about the strategy "I think that means...".

We are already writing a school story. Classes have selected one part of the narrative structure to write and illustrate. This book is currently going around the classes and already looks amazing. This story will be completed for us all to read during Book Week.

In Year 2, we have started our drama unit on different emotions with some short clips from the movie *Inside Out*. Together we have had fun looking at some of the different emotions that people feel, discussing what emotions we know and the different situations that can make us feel that way.

PARLIAMENTARY PRAYER BREAKFAST


