Leadership at the Zoo

How love precedes compassion, and compassion promotes action.

I went to the Zoo as part of my Masters in Leadership course. It was amongst the finest leadership seminars that I have ever attended.

As those on the course arrived we shared how mystified we were to be at the Zoo.

We were doubly curious upon discovery that the focus of our leadership day was the Melbourne Zoo's response to the plight of the Orangutan population in Borneo.

The Orangutan is an endangered species. The Bornean Orangutan population has declined by 60% in the past 60 years and is projected to decline by 82% over 75 years.

The greatest threat to their survival is human's clearing forests to cultivate land. The predominant crop is palm oil, which is used in a wide variety of products.

The leaders of the Melbourne Zoo were convicted that they needed to lead the rescue of the Orangutan.

They believed the solution lay in information, love and compassion.

The Zoo accepted the challenge of informing Australian consumers that palm oil was in the products that they were purchasing. However, manufacturers were not required to list palm oil as an ingredient under Australian food regulations. The leaders of the zoo decided to become a lobby group to change this requirement. They were successful in this cause.

Then they campaigned to raise awareness of the Orangutan's circumstances in Borneo. They asked Australians to assist the Orangutan by not purchasing products with palm oil as an ingredient.

The result was that people felt sad for the Orangutans. However, despite greater levels of information producing a deeper understanding of the issues, an increase in action never materialised.

The leaders at the zoo understood that the love was the missing ingredient. They proposed that people falling in love with the Orangutan would change everything.

So, they rebuilt the Orangutan enclosures. People were able to observe the lovable and remarkable characteristics of these intelligent and caring primates.

Love did change everything. Importantly, it bred compassion, which shifted a private sadness over the Orangutan's situation to a swell of compassionate action.

Calvin isn't a zoo.

Love is still at the centre of our endeavours. Not just because of Christian faith, but because it impels us to act in the world.

Scripture tells us:

Seeing the people, He felt compassion for them, because they were distressed and dispirited like sheep without a shepherd. Then He said to His disciples, The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Matthew 6:36-37

Our desire is to foster both compassion and train the 'workers' to go into the world.



Registrations open for Debate Camp 2018

Registrations remain open for our summer Debate Camp, to be held at Orana Guide Camp in Roches Beach from the 11th to the 14th of January 2018.



The camp is open to students who will be in **grades 10 to 12 in the 2018 school year.** Running for three and a

half days, the schedule will include knowledge workshops, skills exercises, social events and several formal debates, providing a unique opportunity for students to develop the knowledge and skills necessary to debate at a high level and to collaborate with debaters from around the state. Experience with debating is not necessary, and **all interested students are encouraged to participate**. We will work with individual debaters at their own pace to ensure they get the most out of the program.

The camp will be fully supervised by experienced adjudicators, all of whom hold current Working with Children Checks. The cost to participants will be \$120, covering activities, food and accommodation for the duration of the camp. Financial support is available for students who cannot otherwise afford to attend.
