### **YEAR 3 - SCIENCE**

### Year 3 - Term | Science

In Science this Term, Year 3 have been studying things that are living, non-living and once living. We know that in order for something to be classified as living, it must satisfy the seven characteristics of living things. All seven characteristics must be met.

We would like to share with you the scientific characteristics that determine if something is living:

- Growth living things increase in size and can repair some damaged parts;
- Movement living things can change their position in their environment by themselves. Plants, although slower and limited in their movement, can move;
- Reproduction living things create similar organisms to themselves;
- Sensitivity living things can sense and respond to stimuli in their environment;
- Respiration living things convert energy from the environment (food) for use – a process which requires oxygen;
- Elimination/Excretion living things produce waste which must be removed from the organism;
- Feeding/Nutrition all living things have a continual need to take in food for the nutrients which are required for growth.

We have done a Science experiment about one category of living things – plants. We planted some rocket and radish seeds in a shoebox. One half of the shoebox was exposed to sunlight while the other half was covered by a lid, denying those seeds natural light. Both sides were watered.

Our class had to predict what we thought might happen to the seeds that were denied sunlight. Most of us predicted that the plants denied sunlight would not grow as well as those exposed to sunlight, because plants need light (amongst other things), to grow.

We checked the findings of our experiment yesterday against our predictions from last week. As you can see from the photos, we were correct!

God truly is amazing the way he figured out exactly what living things need in order to survive and then provided those things for us!!!

Materials: • u seedlings (such as bean plants) in small plastic pots or containers • water • scissors • large cardboard box with lid, lined with plastic Procedure: • Cur a hole (about the size of a 50c coin) close to the edge of one side of the box lid • Put two of the seedlings into the box directly under the hole and two at the other end of the box. • Put the lid on the box and place it in a bright area. 

### YEAR I visit the Sustainability Learning Centre

On Thursday March 22nd, Year I visited the Sustainability Learning Centre at Hobart College for a 'Minibeast Adventure'. We began the morning looking at a variety of insects and other Minibeasts in glass bottles. We then looked at a variety of stick insects and mealworms. Soon we went bush armed with our drop-sheets and magnifying glasses to find a selection of little creatures in the wild.

Students collected an arrangement of sticks and bracken to assist them to make clay Minibeasts back in the centre. Ruth, the centre teacher, discussed how to make worm farms. After lifting the lids on the compost heaps she was met with a few comments on the smell followed by some pinched noses. The children were entranced with the worms and made their own worm farm out of plastic

bottles. They happily delved into the handful of worms presented ready to introduce them to their new habitat!

All in all it was a fantastic learning experience which consolidated our classroom studies on Minibeasts.

### Metro Bus Service News - Rosny Park Interchange



Clarence City Council is undertaking a pavement upgrade project in the Rosny Park interchange during the period from **I6 April to 6 May** inclusive. The final week of works coincides with the first week of Term Two.

The interchange is being temporarily relocated to Bligh St between Ross Ave and Gordons Hill Road for the duration of the works. Stops A-D will be on the council chambers / police station side of Bligh St, Stop E will be outside KFC, and Stop G near Petbarn. All stops will be marked with signage and timetables.

All general access and school bus routes will continue to depart from the same stops and at the same times at the temporary interchange location.

Further details, including maps, are available from the Metro website.
