Dear Parents and Carers,

We welcomed renowned psychologist Andrew Fuller to our community this week. In just a brief time Andrew made a deep contribution to the lives of so many people.

Andrew affirmed to the staff the five powerful values around which resilience must be built; Hope, Forgiveness, Trust, Compassion, and Integrity. We are well positioned as a school given our faith position and school values which places these as central.

He helped us quantify and shape the nature and degree of our challenge as educators and parents. Andrew described three types of mindsets.

The Resilient mindset. This exists in 45% of students. While these folk still have challenges, they have better coping mechanisms.

The Anxious mindset. This exists in 35% of students. Typically these students become upset at making mistakes. They live a cycle of surge, panic, and collapse. They tend to freeze at key moments, zone out, and are subject to poor decision making

The Avoidant mindset. This exists in 20% of students. Their pattern of behaviour is to procrastinate, refuse to do work, avoid through distraction. Their cortisol levels are high, and as a consequence of high stress their dopamine levels are low.

Andrew gave the staff clear practical strategies to influence students in moving from being Avoidant Learners and Anxious Learners and assisting them to move to be Resilient Learners.

Andrew's work with the students also left a definite impact. He has established a foundation for the continuation of the deepening of their understanding and their skill sets. Interestingly, the students had the expectation that Andrew would provide clear dot points to combat anxiety. Instead, he facilitated them establishing a clearer sense of their unique identity. This clearer more defined sense of personal identity and unique capability is, of course, the greatest antidote to anxiety.



From the Deputy Principal - Primary

Dear Parents and Families.

This week we had a visit from Andrew Fuller, a clinical psychologist who works with many organisations, schools and communities in Australia and internationally, specialising in the wellbeing of people, teams and families. Andrew worked with our K-12 Staff and parents in after school meetings on Monday night and with our students in Years 6-12 on Tuesday. One of his main messages is that every student is smart. Our job as educators and parents is helping our students to discover, and then develop, their areas of skill and passion. This in turn will help them achieve success in the future. His research shows that the number one contributor to success is emotional regulation. This is best fostered when students have adults around them that role model and help them develop the following traits: Trust, Forgiveness, Integrity, Hope and Compassion. These traits fit perfectly with the Christian beliefs that underpin our school pedagogy, and with parent partnership, we will continue our strong capacity to develop successful students and learners both now and in the future.

Hobbit House

Earlier this year, Mr Boonstra and his Year 9 Woodwork class were set a challenge from Mrs Jaeger to design and build a 'Reading Cubby' for the library. The theme for this was decided to be a Hobbit House, from the book 'The Hobbit'. On Thursday this week, Mr Boonstra and the Year 9 class delivered their finished product in an opening ceremony with Mr Belot and Mrs McCallum's Year 2 class. The house has been very well designed and crafted and will be a fantastic addition to the library environment. HUMANITIES - NATIONAL HISTORY CHALLENGE

Last Saturday 15 September was judging time for all our student entries in the National History Challenge. Calvin had representation in primary, secondary and senior secondary – the only school to have such a variety of entries.

The theme this year was "Turning Points" and students were required to research a topic that interested them and demonstrate how there were turning points in that research.

Primary Students

 Year 6 - Lucas Boks, Jacob Lanting, Sam El-Tahche and Michael Shim did a film showing how war and the threat of war had been turning points for their families in coming to Tasmania.

Secondary Students

- Year 9 Olivia Bittner's topic about her great-grandfather was set against the backdrop of World War II – an ethnic German living in Poland and the turbulent times he endured before immigrating to Australia.
- Year 9 Jaylen Emery's essay explored how the moon landing had been such a turning point for science and technology, even down to the fabric from which sports shoes are made.
- Year 10 James Tyers' film was about how decimalisation of Australia's currency was a turning point for every aspect of Australian economy and culture, 14th February 1966.
- Year 10 Sam Excell's essay interviewed Dominic Smee who volunteered to be a Richard III body double as he had the same scoliosis, and how that was a turning point not only for Dominic, but also in the scholarship about understanding how Richard III would have fought in battle.
- Year 12 Vincent Mukundu's essay was how the Treaty of Versailles was such a turning point for the German nation.

Such a variety of research really impressed the judges. The top three entries for each grade level and special category has been forwarded to Canberra for judging in October by the National Judges.

However, for so many students from one school to have been chosen among the top three Tasmanian State entries reflects the energy, hard work and perseverance that each of these students has displayed in achieving such a standard. Congratulations.
